Secretary's Report Vicky Jefferis, AP Secretary



Cdr Larry Jefferis, AP, called the meeting to order at 6:45 PM July 23, 2011 at Skippers Fish Camp, Darien, GA. Richard Jones, AP, led the Pledge of Allegiance. Larry introduced Past Commanders John Rodgers, SN, Charles Wilsdorf, SN and Jeff

Wolf from Fox Valley Power Squadron.

New recently upgraded Junior Navigators were recognized: Coy Hodges, Jack Sterret and Lisa Noetzel. Congratulations to all! We have three new members: Floyd Pruitt and Skip & Mary Roeder. Larry welcomed visitors Jeff Wolf, Linda Lidster, Rob Hohert, John & Carolyn Vann, and Bill Bartlett. Next, he presented the invocation.

Following dinner, Cdr Jefferis resumed the meeting and presented certificates to George Eshliman, P, and Richard Jones for completing the VHF Seminar. Secretary Vicky Jefferis, AP, confirmed a quorum was present. Minutes of the June 2011 meeting were on each table and she asked they be read and approved. Minutes approved as presented.

Treasurer Linda Mahoney, S, presented the Treasurer's Report. Projected Balance on Hand 31 July is \$6,904.50.

Following up on members' interest in a Squadron Cruise, Larry announced that Emil & Jennifer Hoffman have volunteered to serve as Cruise Captains and are planning a cruise to Fernandina Beach Marina. The Marina is full on Labor Day Weekend, so our options are the weekend of 12 – 14 August or late October. No one date works for everyone, so we'll schedule a trip for August. Everyone should encourage friends to join us. Richard Jones noted that as we travel the ICW, shoaling has shifted in the Brick hill area near Marker 64, and we need to stay to the East side of the channel.

Once again, the topic of changing meeting dates was brought to the membership. In order to get a sensing of preferences, Larry asked for a show of

hands regarding changing meeting dates from the 4th Saturday of the month to the 4th Friday of the month. Results were split with 7 voting to keep the date on the 4th Saturday and 7 voting to change to the 4th Friday. One member suggested changing to a "floating" Saturday near the end of the each month.

Larry introduced Merit Marks as the next topic. A merit mark is the only means the Squadron has for recognizing or rewarding members for contributing to the goals of USPS. Merit marks are awarded on the basis of substantial personal efforts and/or results on behalf of USPS. At the end of each year, the Commander recommends members for merit marks based upon each member's contributions to accomplishing the Squadron's objectives.

He provided several examples of actions that have been rewarded in the past: teaching a class or section of a large class; helping staff a booth promoting the Squadron and/or boating safety; writing articles for the Porthole, D26 True, or USPS Ensign; serving on the Bridge or a committee; planning, organizing and presenting a Change of Watch or other significant event.

Once someone receives 5 merit marks, the member earns the Senior Member designation. Twenty Five merit marks earns someone the Life Member status and in most cases dues are waived. Larry informed the members that there are several upcoming events where volunteers are needed and helping/participating in these activities are a great way to earn a merit mark for this year.

SEO Charles Wilsdorf reported the Advanced Piloting class work is finished. All four students are working to complete their tests. There are several members who could benefit from a Seamanship class, so he would like to offer one in September. Please contact

Charles if you are interested in attending or teaching. The ABC Class was next up for discussion since response been so low. This seems to be at least partially due to the fact that our publicity efforts are not working as we would like. Please contact Vicky if you can help with our public relations activities. The Surveyors Angle

This Surveyors Angle article, written by Frank Barron, may seem a little late but it's not Frank's fault. I felt we should include it because the information is important even if a little late. Cdr Jefferis

How are you feeling today? Stiff? Tired? We all do at some point, and we go to the doctor to try to understand what goes on inside our body. Well what goes on inside us or under the hood can be a mystery... So even though it may be a mystery how it works, we all depend on that it works. The same goes for our boats, so we don't have to go thru our boating lives blindly.

What made me think of this is our guests/crew this week. As I write this we are conducting a charter here in the B.V.I. for some guests from Virginia. On the first day, after safety briefings and all, a couple that had never sailed

before came to me asking all sorts of questions..... Surprisingly I've taken it for granted that everybody thinks about what's under the hood – or below the decks.

Well there are some similarities in all these "systems" of our bodies, car and boats. This couple wondered how "all this works". So I broke it down like this:

Your body requires a source of fuel and a place to store it. Your tummy, right. Yea, I know, some of us are blessed with bigger "tanks" than others. But this fuel is essential for survival of our bodies and the boats viability. At the heart of this particular system is the fuel pump – just like yours, take care of it, keep it healthy & clean and it will last a long time. Ensure you have A.B.Y.C. approved fuel lines. Keep'em clean & properly routed to prevent chaffing or puncturing. Like our body, the fuel system cannot operate alone – there's more to our boat than that. You have an electrical system on board, just like your central nervous system with many branches and levels of importance. Also in this system are limited amounts of "signals" or power that can be accommodated along any given branch. Just like you, when it gets overloaded, things go awry. Keep it simple, know how much it can handle and be aware of its sensitivities. And at the first sign of something amiss – investigate immediately!

Neither of the above two does a boat make. There is more complexity to a boat. There is a plumbing system too. Some subsystems handle fresh water in, a holding tank and a discharge route. Only approved items are allowed in – failure to adhere to this can have very unpleasant consequences. Again, keep it clean and give it a regular check-up. Now we have another system – a hard system. It can consist of controls such as Teleflex cables, push cables for steering or throttle management. Just as we are respectful of the limits and care of our tendons and ligaments, do so for your boat. Protect them, keep them lubricated and flexible – they will serve you faithfully for a long time.

And then there is the largest organ of our body – the epidermis. We've all heard our mothers harp "go wash your hands...". So we do, but how do we take care of this organ? We wash it to keep germs away, we apply protective barriers to prevent sunburn, we lotion ourselves to keep us young and supple and some apply colors and shades to accentuate desired features. Well, do the same for you boats "epidermis" – keep her clean and looking good – repair blemishes, attend to breaks immediately. She'll reward you not just in looking good on your arm, but the personal satisfaction of knowing you're doing the very best for her.

So what does all this mean? Well, as I explained to our charter clients, it's really not all that hard to understand how this boat works. Just think of the "systems knowledge" that we've all been obliquely studying all our lives, break it down and apply it to your boat. Once you've grasped the concept then dig in (caution about the body analogy here!), look around and you'll start seeing your boat in new ways – a deeper dimension. Look at the schematics, crawl around with a flashlight. You'll start seeing things in a more comprehensive way. Knowledge is power.
