


sailboat for years and learned to live with each other; so, having the space of our home makes it pretty easy to get along.

Since our activity calendar was wiped clean of every activity, we are spending most of our waking hours trying to finish our after Irma home rebuild.

We don't want any outside help during quarantine, but Sharon is finishing the floor in the master bedroom while I cut concrete and paint.

We made our last Lowes and Home Depot runs last week...with a list that should give us everything we need to keep busy here during an isolation that we hope will end in about three weeks.

Lastly, but most importantly, our newest granddaughter arrived on March 28....The beautiful Little Natalie Rose Puziss and her parents are fine (keeping their distance from everyone) up in the Chicago suburbs.

Stay safe and stay healthy, we all look forward to when we can again share time and stories.


Mike and Sharon Moye
